A full time Juvenile Probation Officer will work in Hardin and Tyler Counties with law enforcement agencies, schools, and families. The juvenile officer will report directly to the Chief Probation Officer, who will be the coordinator of juvenile services.

Juvenile services include intake of referrals, administration, counseling, and court actions. A small percentage of cases appear in court for official disposition. The majority of juvenile offenses are one time incidents that require administrative action and counseling. New offenses require the greater amount of time, one hour of work on the intake of a new offense with the present caseload will allow four new cases per day, twenty cases per week and a maximum of eighty cases a month. Half of an officer's time will be absorbed working with new cases. The remainder of the time will be with probationers and other counseling. The juvenile officer will have an office in Hardin County Courthouse. Schools will be contacted and direct lines of communication will allow early detection of juvenile problems and determinant of early problems.

There are no predictions of a reduction in juvenile delinquency because of one full time officer. The constant growth of the counties is causing the increase in workload. A full time juvenile officer will allow services to be extended to all the juveniles. Better service will reduce reapeat offenses.

A. Background and Justification

Hardin and Tyler Counties are limited in financial support

for probation services.

The adult probation officer is a part-time juvenile officer. A full time juvenile officer will work with thirty-five new cases per month and will provide counseling services for approximately one hundred cases per month.

B. A juvenile officer will be able to provide more service. This will compensate for county growth and minimize repeat offenders.

- C. Juvenile services will be provided for all offenses. No reduction in reported offenses is expected, however, repeat offenses will be reduced. A 50% reduction of repeat offenses will be the goal of the probation department and can be made possible by applying more time with each case.
- D. The plan for the project is a recognition of the need for greater service to juveniles with a continuation of services to expand with the need because of population growth.
- E. Evaluations on a monthly basis will be available for submission along with progress reports on caseload, follow-up of success or failure of counseling, and determinant of juvenile delinquency.

# BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION

Hardin County is a rural county with a population of approximately 31,000. This county is located in Region 15.

Of the 2,196 square miles in the region, 17% of the land area is rural and Hardin County has the largest percent of this rural population. A juvenile population of approximately 7,500 between the ages of 10 and 17 years exists in Hardin County.

Preliminary figures compiled in Hardin County, Texas, indicate 235 new juvenile cases were handled in Hardin County last year. These cases are primarily for violations of the Penal Code. If truants, runaways, and other C.H.I.N. violations were recorded the number of cases would exceed 500 per year.

Past records are based on limited time and personnel to work with juveniles. One officer has handled both adults and juveniles. Because of a limited budget, hiring additional personnel has been impossible. A continuing increase of juvenile cases requires a full time juvenile officer; however, the budget is insufficient at this time to maintain full juvenile services.

Juveniles, who enter the juvenile justice system, are treated in some way for the crime committed, not for the related problem. Presently, there does not exist a way to systematically divert the pre-delinquent, adjudicated, apprehended, or incarcerated juveniles from the juvenile justice system by counselling or rehabilitation services.

This project addresses many needs. Juveniles need specific services which address their delinquency problems. Early intervention prevents deeper involvement in problems of social adjustment that juveniles experience. A full time juvenile officer will be able to work directly with delinquent conduct as well as other offenses. The increase of population in Hardin County is a major contributing factor to the need for additional services a juvenile probation officer can offer.

A rapid growth rate of rural areas, such as Lumberton, with juveniles from large cities, such as Beaumont, are moving to the rural areas and are having difficulties in adjusting to the absence of activities that they are use to in the larger cities. A copy of Juvenile Report of the Texas Judicial Council for 1976 & 1977 is attached. This

report is a record of the efforts of a part-time juvenile officer and only indicates the more serious and repeat offenses.

The other County making up the 88th District Probation Department is Tyler County. Although no records are available with the Texas Judicial Council, the same needs exist in Tyler County with new cases averaging approximately ten (10) per month. As in Hardin County, money is not available to hire a full-time juvenile probation officer. The need for full time service is increasing daily. The population of juvenile age youths is about 2,500 with a very similar geographic area as Hardin County.

A constant input of 35 to 40 reported juvenile cases per month and non-offense counselling services, not to mention 15 - 20 adjudicated delinquents on probation or those youths on informal adjustment requires a full-time juvenile officer in Hardin and Tyler Counties.

The following standard grant conditions, (where applicable), must be certified and agreed to by the applicant in order to validate the application. #### Standard Grant Conditions

- 1. Project initiation. Acceptance of the grant award must be returned to the CJD within 30 days after the date of the award, if an approved project has not commenced within 60 days after acceptance of the grant award, the grantee will report by letter the steps taken to initiate the project, reasons for the delay, and expected starting date. If 90 days after acceptance of the award the project is not operational, a further statement of implementation delay will be submitted by the grantee to the Criminal Justice Division. On receipt of the 90-day letter CJD may cancel the project and redistribute the funds to other project areas. CJD, where warranted by extenuating circumstances, may request approval from the LEAA regional office to extend the implementation date of the project past the 90-day period.
- 2. Project completion. With the exception of the final project report, final financial report, and liquidation of goods or services encumbered before the termination date, grants must be completed no later than the termination date set forth in the Statement of Grant Award or any approved extension thereof. Grantees should keep in mind the grant condition prohibiting the obligation of funds beyond such termination dates, the requirement for liquidation of obligations within 90 days after the termination date, and the requirement for the return of unobligated grant funds within such period.
- 3. Reports. The grantee shall submit, at such times and in such forms as may be prescribed, any reports that the Criminal Justice Division may require, including quarterly financial and progress reports and final financial and progress reports. The grantee's failure to submit required reports within the prescribed time constraits may result in unnecessary delays in the processing of request for funds.
- 4. Fiscal regulations. The fiscal administration of grants shall be subject to such rules, regulations, and policies concerning accounting and records, payments of funds, cost allowability, submission of financial reports, etc., as may be prescribed by CJD.
- 5. Utilization and payment of funds. Funds awarded may be expended only for purposes and activities covered by the grantee's approved project plan and budget. Payments will be made on the basis of periodic requests and estimates of fund needs submitted by the grantee. Payments will be adjusted to correct previous overpayments or underpayments.
- 6. Written approval of changes, Grantees must obtain prior written approval from CJD for major project changes. These include (a) changes of substance in project activities, design, or research plans set forth in the approved application; (b) changes in the project director or other key personnel identified in the approved application; (c) expenditure of project funds representing more than a 15 percent or \$2,500 variation, whichever is greater, between category of the total approved budget, including both CJD grant funds and gruntee contribution; and (d) all additions to or deletions of approved equipment purchases. Any project changes in the grantee's prerogative to initiate are subject to cost allowability and budget guidelines that may be described in the CJD publications mentioned in the preamble to this section.

- 7. Maintenance of records. Financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, required reports, and all other records pertinent to the grant project or any component part thereof shall be retained for three years from the date of the grantlee's submission of the right expenditure report, except that records for the grant coperty acquired with federal grant runds shall be retained for three years after final disposition. The records shall be retained beyond the three-year period if audit findings have not been resolved. Provisions to this effect must be included in all contracts, subcontracts, or other arrangements for implementation of this project or any component thereof.
- 8. Inspection and audit. The State of Texas, the U.S. Department of Justice, and Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their duly authorized representatives shall have access to any books, documents, papers, and records pertinent to this grant project for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts, and transcripts. A provision to this effect shall be included in all contracts, subcontracts, or other arrangements for implementation of this project or any component thereof.
- 9. Termination of aid. A grant may be terminated or fund payments withheld by CJD if it finds a substantial failure to comply with the provisions of P.L. 90-351 as amended or regulations or guidelines promulgated thereunder, including these grant conditions or application obligations, but only after notice and hearing and pursuant to all procedures set forth in applicable CJD rules and guidelines.
- 10. Obligation of grant funds. Grant funds may not, without advance written approval by CjD, be obligated prior to the effective date or subsequent to the termination date of the grant period. Obligations must be related to goods or services provided and utilized for ultimate program purposes.
- 11. Title to property. Title to property acquired wholly or partly with grant project funds in accordance with approved budgets shall vest in the grantee, subject to divestment at the option of LEAA or CJD (to the extent federal funds contributed to the acquisition thereof) exercisable on notice within 180 days after the end of the grant period or termination of the grant. The grantee shall exercise due care in the use, maintenance, protection, and preservation of such property during the period of grantor interest.
- 12. Use of property for criminal justice purposes. All property acquired with grant project funds or donated property representing a grantee contribution shall be committed to use for law enforcement purposes throughout its useful life.
- 13. Project income. An income earned by a grantee with respect to grant funds or as a result of conduct of the grant project (sale of publications, registration fees, service charges on fees, etc.) must be accounted for. All project income must be applied to project purposes or as a reduction of total project cost.
- 14. Publications. Grantee may publish at its expense the results of grant activity without prior CjD review, provided that any publication (written, visual, or sound) includes acknowledgement of CJD grant support. The following disclaimer must be included in the acknowledgement:

The fact that the Criminal Justice Division provided financial support to the activity described in this publication does not necessarily indicate CJD concurrence in the statements or conclusions contained herein.

At least three copies of any such publication must be provided to CJD. CJD reserves the right to require additional copies before or after review of the original three. Publication with grant funds of copies beyond those required by CJD must be provided for in the approved application plan and budget. For large quantity publication, CJD may require advance submission of manuscript.

15. Copyrights. Where activities supported by this grant produce original books, manuals, films, computer programs (including executable computer programs and supporting data in any form), or other copyrightable material, the grantee may copyright such, but CID reserves a royalty-fee, nonexclusive, and

irrevocable license to produce, publish, and use such materials, and to authorize others to do so. Disposition of royalties will be determined by CJD. Provisions appropriate to effectuate the purposes of this condition must be in all employment contracts, consultants' agreements, and other contracts.

- 16. Patents. If any discovery of invention arises or is developed in the course of or as a result of work performed under this grant, by the grantee or contractor, the grantee shall refer the discovery or invention to CJD, which is determine whether or not patent possible will be sought; how any rights therein, including patent rights, will be disposed of and administered; and the need for other action required to protect the public interest in work supported with federal funds, all in accordance with the Presidential Memorandum of October 10, 1963, on Government Patent Policy. In the final narrative report the grantee shall identify any discovery or invention arising under or developed in the course of or as a result of work performed under this grant or shall certify that there are no such inventions or discoveries.
- 17. Allowable costs. The allowability of costs incurred under any grant shall be determined in accordance with the general principles of allowability and standards for selected cost items set forth in Federal Management Circular 74-4, "Principles for Determining Costs Applicable to Grants and Contracts with State and Local Governments," 74-7, "Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants-In-Aid to State and Local Governments," and Federal Management Circular 73-8, "Principles in Determining Costs Applicable to Research and Development Under Grants and Contracts with Educational Institutions."
- 18. Expenses not allowable. Grant funds may not be expended for (a) items not part of the approved budget or subsequently approved by CJD; (b) purchase of land and/or payment of real estate mortgages or taxes; (c) construction of buildings or implementation of improvements thereon unless specifically provided for in the grant agreement; (d) entertainment, amusements, or social activities, or incidental costs related thereto; and (e) purchase of automobiles or other automotive vehicles unless provided for in the grant agreement.
- 19. Proposal costs. Grant funds may not be committed or expended for costs of preparing proposals without prior CJD approval.
- 20. Third party participation. No contract or agreement not incorporated in the approved proposal or approved in advance by CJD may be entered into by the grantee for execution of project activities or provision of services to a grant project (other than purchase of supplies or standard commercial or maintenance services less than \$3,000). Any such arrangements shall provide that the grantee will retain ultimate control and responsibility for the grant project and that the contractor shall be bound by these grant conditions and any other requirements applicable to the grantee in the conduct of the project.
- 21. Release of information.
