1. INTENDED USE

VERDICT-II is a one-step immunochromatographic test for the rapid, qualitative detection of cannabinoids (THC), cocaine, opiates, amphetamines and phencyclidine (PCP) in human urine. The test detects the major metabolites of these drugs at the following cut-off concentrations:

THC	Tetrahydrocannabinol	50 ng/mL
COC	Cocaine (Benzoylecgonine)	300 ng/mL
OPS	Opiates (Codeine/Morphine)	300 ng/mL
AMP	Amphetamine	1000 ng/mL
PCP	Phencyclidine	25 ng/mL

This product is intended for use under medical supervision in hospitals, physician offices, health clinics and drug treatment/counseling centers. It is not for over-the-counter sale.

VERDICT-II PROVIDES ONLY A PRELIMINARY ANALYTICAL TEST RESULT. A MORE SPECIFIC ALTERNATE CHEMICAL METHOD MUST BE USED IN ORDER TO OBTAIN A CONFIRMED ANALYTICAL RESULT. GAS CHROMATOGRAPHY/ MASS SPECTROMETRY (GC/MS) IS THE PREFERRED CONFIRMATORY METHOD. CLINICAL CONSIDERATION AND PROFESSIONAL JUDGMENT SHOULD BE APPLIED TO ANY DRUG OF ABUSE TEST RESULT, PARTICULARLY WHEN PRELIMINARY POSITIVE RESULTS ARE USED.

2. SUMMARY AND EXPLANATION OF THE TEST

Marijuana is an hallucinogenic agent derived from the flowering portion of the hemp plant. Smoking is the primary method of use. Marijuana contains a number of active ingredients collectively known as cannabinoids. The primary cannabinoid in marijuana is THC. Marijuana use affects motor skills, eye tracking, and perceptual functions, but no consistent correlation has been established between the degree of use and the onset of physical effects. Studies have

shown that passive inhalation of marijuana smoke under restrictive conditions of extreme exposure can result in the presence of detectable (greater than 20 ng/mL but less than 100 ng/mL) levels of marijuana metabolites in the urine of exposed individuals. It has been found, however, that when a 50 ng/mL screening level is chosen, passive inhalation may be ruled out at the 95% confidence limit. 1,2

Cocaine is a central nervous system stimulant producing an intense feeling of euphoria. Although tolerance to and physical dependence on cocaine have not been demonstrated, psychological dependence probably develops.³ The two most prevalent methods of using cocaine are nasal inhalation (snorting) and smoking of the free-base form of the drug (crack).⁴

Opiates are a class of natural and semisynthetic drugs that include morphine, codeine and heroin. Opiates affect the central nervous system and produce feelings of euphoria. Abusers of opiates develop both a physical and psychological dependence on the drugs. Codeine and morphine are powerful analgesics used in prescription drugs. Heroin, a derivative of morphine, is truly an abused drug. Heroin can be taken several ways: smoking, nasal inhalation (snorting), subcutaneous injections (skin popping) and intravenous injections (mainlining).⁵

Amphetamines are mind-altering stimulants that excite the central nervous system. This group of compounds includes amphetamine, methamphetamine and related designer drugs that are similar both chemically and pharmacologically to the naturally occurring compounds, epinephrine and norepinephrine. Amphetamines produce a wakeful state accompanied by a sense of increased energy, self-confidence, well-being and even euphoria. Prolonged and/or high dose use of amphetamines can result in irrational behavior, poor mental acuity and paranoid behavior including psychosis.⁶

Amphetamines are usually taken orally, intravenously or by nasal inhalation (snorting). Smoking is a favored method of methamphetamine use. Methamphetamine is excreted in the urine in both the unchanged form and as the primary metabolite, amphetamine. Detection of amphetamine in urine is extremely dependent on urine pH, with alkaline conditions slowing excretion and acidic conditions increasing it.⁷

PCP is a hallucinogenic drug available in powder, capsule or tablet form. It may be taken by nasal inhalation (snorting), intravenously or orally. It may also be smoked after mixing with marijuana or other shredded leaves such as parsley or oregano.⁷

The effects of PCP are dose related but vary in severity from individual to individual. These effects vary from simple stimulation to schizophrenic psychosis. With large doses, mood changes are totally unpredictable and irrational, violent actions may occur. Trauma is one of the leading causes of death from PCP intoxication.⁸

Many factors influence the length of time required for drugs to be metabolized and excreted in the urine. The most important of these is the half-life of the drug. Half-life refers to the length of time the body requires to reduce the amount of a given drug in the blood by one-half. In addition to half-life, a variety of other factors influence the time period during which drug metabolites are present in urine. These factors include the rate and efficiency of urine production, the pH, fluid consumption, the amount of drug taken and the length of time over which drug was consumed. Ingesting a large volume of liquid or using diuretics may increase urine volume thereby "diluting" the drug in a larger amount of urine making the presence of the drug more difficult to detect. The larger the dose of drug consumed, the longer the time required to reduce the level of drug in the urine to a point where it will no longer be detected. Also, if additional doses of drug are taken before earlier doses are fully eliminated accumulation of drugs or drug metabolites will take place and the time required for all traces of drug to disappear will be increased. Although the above factors make it difficult to arrive at any statement regarding how long after use a drug can be detected in the urine of a particular individual some general times have been establish and these are listed below.⁷

Laboratory-based procedures for detecting drugs/drug metabolites in urine include thin layer chromatography (TLC), gas chromatography/mass spectrometry (GC/MS), radioimmunoassay (RIA) and enzyme immunoassay (EIA).⁵⁻⁷ The qualitative VERDICT-II product utilizes onestep, solid-phase immunoassay technology to provide a very rapid test requiring no instrumentation. This test may be used to screen samples prior to confirmatory testing using quantitative procedures.

3. PRINCIPLES OF THE PROCEDURE

The VERDICT-II test is a one-step, competitive, membrane-based immunochromatographic assay. It allows a single urine sample to be evaluated independently for the presence or absence of each of the five specified drugs using a single test device. The test itself uses dye conjugated monoclonal antibodies which are highly specific for the target drugs. The VERDICT-II device contains a membrane strip which serves as the solid-phase. Each of the five drugs, conjugated to either bovine serum albumin (BSA) or immunoglobulin (IgG) is immobilized at a specific location on the membrane.

The test operates on the principle that highly specific immunochemical reactions occur between antigens and antibodies and that these interactions can be used to detect specific substances in biological fluids. Analytes present in the urine sample compete with analytes coupled to BSA or IgG for binding sites on the antibodies.

In this assay, the urine sample is placed in the sample well of the device, and the sample is allowed to migrate along the strip. If any of the five drugs are present in the urine sample, the drug forms a complex with the antibody-dye conjugate specific for that drug, and the complex migrates toward the opposite end of the strip, passing specific locations on the membrane where each of the five drugs is immobilized. Drug present in the urine sample competes with immobilized drug conjugate for the limited number of binding sites in the antibody-dye complex. Thus, when a sufficient amount of drug is present in the urine sample, the drug saturates the antibodies, and the antibody-dye complex cannot bind to the drug conjugate immobilized on the membrane so no line is generated at the drug-specific location in the result window. If drug is absent in the urine sample, as the antibody-dye migrates along the strip, the antibody complex will bind to the immobilized drug conjugate and a line is generated at the drug specific location in the result window.

In addition, a line must form at the Control position in the result window to indicate that the test is working properly. The Control line consists of immobilized polyclonal anti-mouse antibody which captures the monoclonal antibody-dye complex as it passes this region of the membrane. The presence of the Control line indicates that the proper sample volume was used and that the reagents are working properly. If no Control line forms, the test is considered invalid.

4. MATERIALS PROVIDED/STORAGE CONDITIONS

Each VERDICT-II test contains all the reagents necessary to test one urine sample simultaneously for all five drugs.

- 1. One VERDICT-II test device. The test device contains a membrane strip coated with drug conjugates and a pad coated with the five antibody-dye complexes (mouse monoclonals to THC, benzoylecgonine, morphine, amphetamine and phencyclidine) in a protein matrix.
- 2. One disposable sample pipette.

Kit Contents

The VERDICT-II test kit (Catalog Number 600594) contains the following:

- 1. Twenty-five (25) test devices in individual foil packages containing a sample pipette.
- 2. One instructional package insert

Storage Conditions

The kit, in its original packaging, should be stored at 2-25 °C (35-77°F) until the expiration date on the label.

5. PRECAUTIONS

- Urine specimens and all materials coming in contact with them should be handled and disposed of as if infectious and capable of transmitting infection. Never pipette by mouth and avoid contact with broken skin.
- 2. Avoid cross-contamination of urine samples by using a new urine specimen container and pipette for each urine sample.
- 3. The VERDICT-II device should remain in its original sealed foil pouch until ready to use. If the pouch is damaged, do not use the test.
- 4. Do not store the test kit at temperatures above 25°C (77°F).
- 5. Do not use tests after the expiration date printed on the package label.
- 6. For in vitro diagnostic use only.

6. SAMPLE/COLLECTION AND PREPARATION

The urine sample should be collected in a clean glass or plastic container. Two drops of urine or approximately $100~\mu L$ is required for each test. Collection of 45 mL of urine is more than sufficient for initial and subsequent testing. No preservatives should be added. Urine may be tested immediately following collection. If it is necessary to store the urine, store under refrigeration for no more than one day. Urine may be frozen for longer storage. Stored urine must be brought to ambient temperature (18 to 25° C/64 to 77° F) and mixed well to assure a homogeneous sample prior to testing.

7. MATERIALS REQUIRED BUT NOT PROVIDED

1. Urine collection container.

NOTE: Specimen containers, disposable gloves and urine temperature strips are available from MEDTOX Diagnostics, Inc.

8. TEST PROCEDURE

Negative:

- 1. Open one pouch for each sample to be tested and label the device with the patient or sample identification (ID).
- Holding the pipette at a vertical angle, dispense two (2) drops of urine (\sim 100 μ L) into the sample well.
- 3. Read the results after 5 minutes but within 7 minutes of sample application.

9. READING THE TEST RESULTS

The appearance of both a reddish-purple Control (CTRL) line and a specific drug line indicates a negative test result. The color intensities of the Control line and a specific drug line may not be equal; any line of faint color intensity

visible within 7 minutes indicates a negative test result.

Non-Negative: The appearance of a reddish-purple Control (CTRL) line and the absence of a

line next to a specific drug name indicates a preliminary positive test result for

that drug.

Invalid: The absence of a reddish-purple Control (CTRL) line indicates the test is


invalid. The urine sample should be retested on a new VERDICT-II device.

10. INTERPRETATION OF TEST RESULTS

A NEGATIVE test result for a specific drug indicates that the sample does not contain the drug/drug metabolite above the cutoff level.

A POSITIVE test result for a specific drug indicates that the sample contains drug/drug metabolite at or above the cutoff level. It does not indicate the level of intoxication or the specific concentration of drug in the urine sample.

Examples of Negative and Non-Negative results are shown below.



There are other possible results depending on the drug or combination of drugs present in the urine sample.

11. QUALITY CONTROL

Quality control materials are available from commercial sources. These controls can be used as needed to verify performance of VERDICT-II on positive and negative specimens. The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) recommends use of a negative urine sample, a positive control fortified with specific drug metabolites, and a positive control fortified with specific drug metabolites at or near the cutoff concentration. Control materials should be run upon receipt of each new lot of product. Control materials may also be used to assess product performance on a daily basis or if discrepant results are obtained on test samples.

An internal procedural control is included on the VERDICT-II device. A line must form at the Control (CTRL) position in the result window to indicate that the test is working properly. The Control line consists of immobilized polyclonal anti-mouse antibody which captures the monoclonal antibody-dye complex as it passes this region of the membrane. The presence of the Control line indicates that the proper sample volume was used and that the reagents are working properly. If a Control line does not form, the test is considered invalid.

12. LIMITATIONS OF THE PROCEDURE

- 1. VERDICT-II is only for use with unadulterated human urine samples.
- 2. A positive result for any drug(s) in VERDICT-II does not indicate or measure intoxication. It only indicates the presence of specific drug(s) in the urine specimen.
- 3. Test results interpreted after 7 minutes may not be consistent with the original result obtained at the 5 to 7 minute reading. Disregard any results obtained after 7 minutes.
- 4. Certain medications containing opiates or opiate derivatives or amphetamines may produce a positive result in any chemical or immunological assay (see Specificity). Additionally, foods and tea containing poppy products and/or coca leaves may produce a positive result. Prolonged passive inhalation of THC may also produce a positive result.
- 5. There is a possibility that other substances and/or factors not listed above, e.g. technical or procedural errors, may interfere with the test and cause false results.

13. EXPECTED VALUES

The preferred method for confirming the presence or absence of THC, cocaine, opiates, amphetamines and phencyclidine and/or their metabolites in urine is GC/MS. This method detects specific drug metabolites as an indicator of drug use. SAMHSA recommends the following cutoffs for determination of positive samples by GC/MS⁹:

THC	11-nor-9-carboxy-Δ ⁹ -THC	15 ng/mL
COC	Benzoylecgonine	150 ng/mL
OPI	Morphine and Codeine	300 ng/mL

Precision

Performance of VERDICT-II around the specific cutoff for each drug was evaluated by testing standard drug solutions diluted in drug-free urine in replicates of 20 each on 3 different days by 3 operators. Twenty replicates of drug-free urine were also tested on each day. At 25% above the cutoff, the precision of each assay was as follows: THC=95%, COC=100%, OPI=100%, AMP=100%, and PCP = 98%.

Reproducibility

A panel of 55 naturally metabolized human urine samples comprised of drug-free and contaminated samples was prepared. All samples in the panel had been screened for the presence or absence of THC, COC, OPI, AMP, and PCP. In addition each of the 55 samples had also been quantitated by GC/MS conducted at SAMHSA cutoffs for positive samples or at limit of quantitation for negative samples to determine the concentration of a specific drug. The concentration of primary metabolite in the positive samples was between 66 and 198ng/mL for THC, 487 and 1342ng/mL for COC, 464 and 2000ng/mL for OPI, 1056 and 4622ng/mL for AMP and 32 and 109ng/mL for PCP. The panel was used to evaluate the lot-to-lot and lab-to-lab reproducibility of VERDICT-II.

Lot-to-Lot Reproducibility

Three aliquots of each of the 55 samples were prepared and each of the three sets of aliquots was coded and used to evaluate the performance of one lot of VERDICT-II. There was one incorrect result (a false negative on an amphetamine low positive sample) on the 825 tests for a reproducibility of >99%.

Lab-to-Lab Reproducibility

Three aliquots of each of the 55 samples were prepared and each of the three sets of aliquots was tested by one study participant using one lot of VERDICT-II. There were three incorrect results (one false negative each on an opiate and a PCP low positive sample and one false negative on an opiate high positive sample) on the 825 tests for a reproducibility of >99%.

Specificity

Unrelated Compounds, Prescription and Over-the-Counter Medications

The following materials were tested for reactivity in the VERDICT-II test. Listed compounds were dissolved in appropriate solvents and then added to drug negative urine for testing. At 100 μ g/mL all of the listed compounds were negative in each of the five VERDICT-II tests except for lidocaine and isoxsuprine. On the opiates portion of the test lidocaine was positive at 100 μ g/mL and negative at 50 μ g/mL. On the cocaine portion of the test isoxsuprine was positive at 25 μ g/mL but negative at 10 μ g/mL.

As a federally certified lab, a GSA vendor and a vendor contracted to several states, MEDTOX has an obligation to clear up two of the misconceptions that have arisen over the years in the instant drug-testing field, false positives and false negatives.

Attached is documentation that addresses these two issues when using an instant testing device. These issues are important to you, whether MEDTOX, or someone else, is your supplier.

These documents are written in layman's language, and address questions and issues about which no vendor has taken the time to educate the user community.

False Positives

What is a drug screen, as defined by the Federal Government?

In general, when you do a drug **screen** for opiates (for example), the concentrations all of the opiates and metabolites in the system are chemically summed. If the sum of all of the opiates is greater than 300 ng/ml, this is considered a positive screen for opiates. The same is true for all other classes of drugs. There are several opiates that are considered and included in the sum if they exist.

The same is true for all other drug classes tested, such as marijuana, cocaine, amphetamines and PCP. The sum of all marijuana metabolites must be higher than 50 ng/ml to produce a positive drug screen. Cocaine is 300 ng/ml. Amphetamines is 1000 ng/ml and PCP is 25 ng/ml.

What is important to note is that these are **Federal WORKPLACE guidelines** and the same guidelines that are used nationwide to determine impairment. Actually the workplace guideline for Opiates has been moved to 2000 ng/ml basically to accommodate such items as poppy seed rolls and so forth. The mandated market, which is just about everything but workplace, has kept their standard screen for opiates at 300 ng/ml.

What is a confirmation, as defined by the Federal Government?

Differing from a drug screen which sums the metabolites of a drug class, a confirmation tests the urine for the **single** metabolite with the highest concentration. Please refer to the chart below. **Confirmations do not confirm that a screen is correct**. They test for certain levels of a single metabolite (or drug) as in the table below.

From the beginning there are some interesting items of note in the above chart. What happens when you have 7 metabolites of Marijuana each having a concentration value of 12 ng/ml. You will have a positive drug screen of 84 (7 X 12 = 84). Using the Federal Workplace guidelines for your confirmation, you will be told by most laboratories that the drug test is negative for marijuana. No metabolite is above 15 therefore you will consider your device to have made an error.

In reality, **both were correct**, according to Federal Workplace guidelines. **Based on** the guidelines for workplace, it is possible to have a Positive screen for any drug class and have a negative confirmation.

This is what we call in the mandated world, the **ONE BLIND EYE CONFIRMATION**. If you use a little bit, we will turn a blind eye to it, and the labs won't tell you there is any drug in the urine, it is just reported out as negative.

There are two basic versions of a GC/MS confirmation.

- 1. Cut-off level confirmation (most commonly used in workplace)
- 2. Level of Quantitation confirmation (LOQ)

Number 2 is the one we should be concerned with. In reality, the difference between the cut-off level confirmation and the LOQ confirmation is a software switch on the GC/MS. The difference to you is the difference between being told if the urine has a concentration of drug in it, or not enough to be considered positive in the workplace.

Putting this in perspective, the world of workplace testing is one of testing for impairment. The mandated world (rehab, probation, corrections, missions and so forth) is a zero tolerance world. I doubt many in this world would say it is alright to use a little cocaine, just as long as you test below 150 ng/ml on GC/MS. Does this mean that 149 is ok??

If it doesn't mean that 149 is ok, you should look into LOQ confirmations. An LOQ confirmation will tell you if there is drug in the system. Most (probably over 75%) of the "false positives" you now see when using an instant device, are now **POSITIVES**. In your world is 149 positive for cocaine or not?

How did they legally get cocaine in their system?

Do you want to be informed that it exists, and the value is 149, or just negative?

Do you EVER want to be told negative, if the drug exists?

Why did no supplier of drug testing kits or your lab ever tell you this?

False Negative Drug Tests

Assume you have 100 urine tests to be done, and you test each. You find 5 positives with your instant drug-testing device. All 5 confirm as positive.

How accurate is the device you are using? Is it 100% accurate. Most people think it is, and that is definitely the impression you are left with. The lab always tells you that the tests you send in are positive, just like the device you are using.

Ask yourself the following questions.

When was the last time I questioned a negative drug test?

Am I making the assumption that a device is always right when negative?

Why am I doing the first two items above?

Use the same 100 urine samples above. Use a different device. You find 8 positives with the instant drug-testing device. Seven (7) of the samples confirm positive.

How accurate is the device you are using?


Obviously if you are not comparing devices, and very few people go to the expense to do so, on the same urine sets, you will **ALWAYS FEEL** that the first device is more accurate. But the critical error is that you are **FEELING** it. Five out of five just seems more accurate than 7 out of 8, except when a false negative is considered. Are you choosing less sensitive devices, allowing positive samples through in order to reduce false positives. Is it more harmful to have a false positive which will be caught by the lab, or a false negative YOU WILL NEVER CATCH?


Is a false positive or a false negative a worse mistake. A false positive may cost you \$25. A false negative may cost you your reputation. Or your client.
